## Approved Changes to Design Guidelines

## Approved Grasses

1. Front and Visible Side Yards (forward of the wing fence/ gate)
a. Bermuda Tiff 419
b. Zoysia (Emerald, Zorro or Zeon varieties only)
2. Rear Yards
a. Bermuda Tiff 419
b. Zoysia (Emerald, Zorro or Zeon varieties only)
B. Infill in front yards
3. It is recognized that Bermuda Tiff 419 does not do well in shade or where tree roots compete for nutrients and space. In these cases, if alternative grasses are preferred, Zoysia is recommended.
4. Landscape adjustments should be made such as installing shade tolerant ground cover (Asian Jasmine for example) or mulch in the tree drip line. Significant landscape changes such as these require written approval from the Modifications/ New Constructions Committee. Trees grow their healthiest without competing vegetation near their trunks. As a guideline, it is recommended that tilled tree rings of at least 10 or 12 feet diameter be established.
